Vino vidi vici

WHILE Ronda may be reaping all the kudos for the area's sudden emergence in the wine market, Arriate more than holds its own.

In fact, it was at Cortijo las Monjas, just outside the village, where the resurgence for Ronda's wines started to gather speed. when aristocrat Prince Alfonso Hohenlohe planted a vineyard there. The man credited with setting up Marbella, Hohenlohe had bought the estate in the 1980s and was soon producing a promising wine called Andalus. Along with German Federico Schatz and other Arriate winemaker Juan Manuel Vetas, they lobbied the authorities until the area was finally rewarded its own appellation in the

It was not as if Arriate didn't already have pedigree. Back in Roman days the town was an important area for wine production. At the the 12-hectare Morosanto estate on a hillside overlooking the village staff recently stumbled across the foundations of what was once a Roman bodega.

Immense in size and with most of its foundations still intact, archaeologists have so far found parts of col-umns and statues, a 21-metre Roman swimming pool, a sauna, and even a burial chamber with three female

But that wasn't what so excited local historians.

Amid the ruins that sit on the south-facing slope of the charming Llano de la Cruz valley was a 'lagar' or grape treading floor and pipes through which the wine was transported to vats. This confirmed that wine-making in the area went back to 3AD.

Arriadh, means gardens or orchards. It was during the Moorish control of Andalucia from the 7th to 15th century that the area became a key supply zone for the Arabic town of Ronda, then known as Arunda. Celebrated for its fruits, in particular apples and pears, in the area, known as the Huerta abajo, 50 neighbours still use the same ancient Arabic water course. or alcantarilla, to take wa-

ter to their crops.
The settlement of Arriadh was first mentioned in documents from 1407 during the Arabic Kingdom of Granada when a key skirmish took place in the valley below be-tween Arabic and Christian forces, who were coming in on a reccy visit from nearby Canate la Real.

After the expulsion of the Arabs from Spain, it came under the administration of Ronda, until in 1661 on February 14 the town achieved its total independence, hence the patron saint of the

village San Valentin. It was around this time that most of the land in the valley and the town was owned by the Moctezuma family, one of Ronda's key aristocratic families. Awarded land by

the Reyes Catolicos for their bravery in fighting the Aztecs in Mexico, they lived in Ronda, but had a big hunting estate around Arriate. Hunting everything from boar to lynxes - that are said to have last been seen in the Sierra de Los Merinos. above the town as recently as two decades ago – they needed a big staff to run the

It is this that makes for a better healthier mix than those pure breed stiffs up in Ronda

It is for this reason that a lot of families are said to have been brought in from the north of Spain to work hence the foundations of the town being laid.

'How else can you explain how so many of the names are alien to this region and so many people here have blue eyes and blonde hair," asks former school master Salvador Conde Melgar. "Bercerra, Conde, Marin, these are names from Galicia and the Basque country. And it is this that to this day makes for a better healthier mix that those pure breed



stiffs up in Ronda." A wealth of narrow roads lead off the main street where you can find a vari-ety of interesting shops and small businesses such as Muebles Serrano, a traditional carpentry workshop that makes and sells handmade furniture. It's owner Francisco Serrano (Paco), an octogenarian, has been making furniture since the age of eight and learned his trade from his father. Paco explained that his father helped to craft the old water-mill wheel that was once situated by the bridge, in the street called Calle Molino (Mill Street), the mill is now a private residence, one of the largest and most beautiful houses in the village, unfortunately the mill wheel was not preserved. Paco is a

member of one of the oldest families in the town and his grandfather, Don Jeronimo Serrano Gomez, was once Mayor of Arriate. His memories of the old days include those of the "Herreros" or Blacksmiths, who were al ways assisted by women from the village whose job was to operate the bellows that kept the fire burning. A hard job! How times have changed!

The cuisine in Arriate is typical of a Serranian town, with Gazpacho ar appetizing cold vegetable soup eaten in summertime and a range of pork products for which Arriate is well-known. Their spe-ciality "cocido Arriateño" is a type of delicious stew, perfect for a winters lunch Sweets on the menu in-

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Arriate is not a sewer

A NUMBER of key issues are affecting Arriate today. Aside from the town's water supply being threatened by the huge, macroproject of Los Merinos golf the town continues to tip raw sewage into its river, the Guadalcobacin. This is despite its mayor Bernadino Gaona being from the so-called IU-Green party alliance, and a river, which once had crabs and crayfish is now filthy and frothing. Despite a new law in 2004 insisting by the end of 2007 that every river in Europe should be sewage-free, the town hall in Arriate has still not even begun to build a sewage works. Continuous promises for a decade to fund and install such works, have fallen on deaf ears after election victories. Now residents have had enough. One, Cesar Aguilo, a music teacher, who works for the Platform in defence of water in the Serrania, said: "It is a disgrace for a party that claims to be environmental. The mayor has promised to install a sewage works for the last 12 years at election times, and every time it is ignored. Now in the latest election promise he claims that they have found 3.6 hectares for the works. But they are not even in Arriate. The land is in Ronda and it is illegal to take land from another municipality for such works.

clude homemade "flan" a delightful wobbly caramel pudding, rice pudding and "tocino del cielo" literally translated as "bacon from heaven", however, this is a sweet creamy caramel pudding usually served with whipped cream.

Señor Garrido said that the original churros were made on the street using a log fire

Arriate has an excellent selection of local restaurants, pubs and tapas bars where you can enjoy a drink and something to eat for a very reasonable price. Places to visit include Bar el Apero, where you can eat typical Arriate dishes, like pigs trotters and snails when in season. Bar Paguito for his excellent breakfasts and Toberna Manolo, which has a unique atmosphere. particularly out the back at *feria* time. Up the hill is Bar Escobar, real local's boozer and there are always two take away chicken shops, El Comi and Pizzeria Laura. There is even some decent nightlife in Arriate, with Bar Esquina always a nice place to hang out, while Los Caireles across the road

always has something interesting happening. El Almacen, a converted wheat store is a modern tapas bar, opened three years ago by cousins Erica and Ruben. The walls are decorated using paintings by a Sevillian artist in the style of Botero (Colombian Artist famous for painting over-weight people and animals!) Their specialities are various pork tapas, the wines are excellent and the sweets homemade and very good. A good choice for a tapas

Arriate still has many fine examples of houses in the typical Andalucian style,

with thick stone walls, beamed ceilings and terracotta tiles. Their mass keeps the houses fresh in the summer and warm and cozy during the winter months. Good examples of these houses can be found in the old part of town and in the Casas Nuevas zone. In par-ticular look out for Casa de piedra, which is for sale in the old part of town for just 169,000 euros (www.andalucia-exclusive.eu), with its own functioning well and leafy garden and "casa la a charming old town house, being sold through Serrania Services (www.la serraniaservices.com)



THERE are few surprises as great as Hotel El Huertecillo tucked away next to the river in the heart of Arriate. A beautifully converted farmhouse, part dug out of caves, the five cottage hotel is the life's work of two local brothers. and easily rivals anywhere else to stay in the Serrania de Ronda. WHERE TO EAT

In the heart of Arriate, this charming restaurant might be worth the journey alone. Right next to the old church and convent this converted storeroom still has its original beams, and, best of all, lovely old wooden doors.

But it is cousins Ruben and Erika's fabu-

lous food that really shines out. Not content to simply knock out the usual venta fare, the range of tapas are always varied and fresh as could be.



The militiaman's escape -Arriate,

Malaga

Go take a hike!

DISTANCE: 2 to 10 kms TIME REQUIRED: 1 to 3 hours **RATING: Easy**

T was during the civil war when Republican troops had to escape quickly from the rapidly advancing armies of General Franco that the Ventilla gorge no doubt becamo in-

Heading straight out of the still staunchly 'rojo' village of Arriate, near Ronda, the Guadalcobacin river cuts a deep gully from its source on the edge of the Sierra de las Nieves national park. And through it the brave militiamen could escape to-wards El Burgo and laterly Malaga, where the Republicans held out for a few extra months.

It has also created one of the most wonderful, little-known escapes from the

summer heat in Malaga province.

A deep, shady paradise full of wildlife and nature, crickets hum, while beeeaters swoop around and the river rushes down from the mountains creating a number of plunge pools to

There are plenty of excellent spots to lay down a towel and read a book and the steep

sides of the weather-beaten gorge are impressive. Walking gently uphill, cross-

ing the river on a couple of occasions, the walk eventually arrives at the source of the river beside the Puente del Ventilla, a popular picnic spot for people from Ronda

and Arriate.
The banks are lined with ash, eucalyptus, olive and oak trees and there is no sign of human life, apart from a couple of ancient ruined mills.

Bring a picnic, but best of all, if you fancy something to do to while away the midday hours, 'borrow' the pack of cards, which some-one has kindly left beside a natural wooden table and chairs knocked together by local goatherd earlier this

Don't get lost

It is a little tricky to find the beginning of the walk. Head into Arriate from Ronda and take the first right off the small square up Calle Marbella. At the top take a left up a narrow street and then a right and you are in Calle Malaga. When the road opens out into the feria ground, park your car and start on walking uphill along Calle Malaga. After about 400 metres, after going past a smelly chicken factory, you will find a sign that reads "Coto deportivo de Caza" and a yellow sign

painted on a wall (see above). Go left and follow the path up to the edge of the gorge where it then drops dramatically down towards the river. You are soon in the trees and the temperature drops dra-matically. You will past a little spring on your right and eventually come down to a picnic spot with a wooden table and chairs. From here you can head up the river keeping an eye out for the white and yellow signs as far as you fancy, and then walk back when you are ready.

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
